

SHRUB RENOVATION

Yes its that time of year again: The question is do I renovate my shrubs now or have them sheared all summer? Ask yourself, do you like your shrubs to have flowers on them during the summer, or just when they are about to bloom have someone show up and shear all of the flowers off.

In study after study they say it is better to renovate most shrubs at certain times of the year. This allows the shrub to reproduce all new growth during it's growth season and allows the shrub to produce flowers. You would be very surprised at how many desert shrubs produce awesome color almost all summer long, like Desert Sage, and Dwarf Oleanders, just to mention a few.

Another great benefit we have discovered is it saves labor in the busy summer months. Most shrubs are renovated during the winter months when things slow down in the landscape. The renovation itself creates less need for trimming in the summer. This allows us to keep a more even labor force year round and it shows up in our landscape maintenance bids.
